


Over the last 2 years throughout the world, we have seen tremendous suffering, despair and hopelessness as people struggle with the effects of the Covid 19 Pandemic. Who would have thought what seemed a fairly small incident in a place that many of us had never heard of, Wuhan, would turn into something that has almost engulfed the whole world. Families have been torn apart, communities destroyed, loved ones lost. How many have

uttered those desperate words of Christ on the Cross, "My God, my God why have you forsaken me". 

So, pray hard, work hard and remain committed and faithful to the historic faith handed on by the Apostles. For although Christ died, he certainly has Risen and, be assured, he will be coming again.

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Resurrection, Hope in Manton

The life of the ‘Transformational Change Priest’ is not one I ever imagined inhabiting as I began to discern a vocation to the priesthood a decade or so ago. Yet that is indeed the role I currently occupy. My name is Father Joe Cooper and I spend most of my time at S. Paul’s, Manton in the Diocese of Southwell and Nottingham.

For those who may be unfamiliar with these types of post, here is a rough outline of my duties. I have been air-dropped into a parish (heading on its current trajectory towards eventual closure), on a fixed three-year term to effect ‘transformational change’. The post is accompanied by a list of five outcomes (three of which have numerical targets attached to them) and twelve priorities. Every quarter I submit a return to the diocese which outlines ‘lag’ and ‘lead measures’, successes, highlights, challenges, risks, and priority points for the next quarter. Whatever you might think about these types of post, for many of us emerging from curacy, they are increasingly becoming the new norm. Please pray for us, for this is our reality and we need the support of the wider catholic constituency.

In the week following my licensing, I wandered across the overgrown church grounds with the list of outcomes in hand and gazed out into a parish with a glorious tapestry of multifaceted needs. Like many catholic parishes



across the land, we find ourselves in one of the most deprived parts of the diocese. We have the usual associated issues too, which many of you will be all too familiar with – very little money and buildings requiring substantial repairs and renovation. Alongside this, the congregation had declined steadily in number over the years to around the six or eight people still here at the time of my licensing. Challenges aplenty indeed, but also a great opportunity to rejuvenate (and God-willing save) one of our many fragile catholic parishes in real danger of being lost.

When I first went to look at the parish in 2020, I was most impressed with the site’s potential. Strategically located at the very heart of a large council estate, with generous grounds accessible by two adjacent streets and with a sizeable and detached hall based within the grounds. It was everything that one could possibly want in terms of assets, but where to start? The diocesan list of outcomes and priorities did not easily correlate with the resources or people available here at S. Paul’s. Over the summer of 2021 I had to quickly to revise the ambitious plans presented at interview simply to be prepared for the September launch. Here are some of the key questions I considered as part of this reflection:

- What do I bring to the parish, what are my gifts and weaknesses?
- What could we do here?
- Who is willing/able to be involved at a practical/hands-on level?
- What is realistically achievable?
- What might we need to place on hold (for now)?

During this process of reflection, it soon became apparent that other than a box of half broken pens and pencils, there was very little else available here in terms of resources, liturgical accessories and equipment. Well, I am a Yorkshireman, and we are thrifty creatures if nothing else! In those summer months I begged, borrowed, and acquired the essential articles and accoutrements any self-respecting catholic parish needs to function. Like a glorious apparition of old, a statue of Our Lady appeared, as did an assortment of vestments (very little matches, but they are at least the correct liturgical colours!), so too did bells, a thurible and stand, missals, a votive stand (loaned to us from the wonderful Charles Farris) and a large haul of sports and crafts

equipment – perfect for children’s work. Ask and you shall indeed receive!

The unique circumstances of this context shaped my decision to focus most of my time, effort, and our limited resources on establishing a range of services and activities for children, youth, and young families. Nothing new there by any means, but it enabled me to put my skills and experience (and that of my small pool of willing volunteers) to best use, rebuilding the parish ‘from the bottom up’ so to speak. As an adult lay-volunteer I have spent many years working with children and young adults. I am also the father of four young sons, (one way to grow the church!) and it is most interesting to observe how from a very early age children develop their own unique



interests and passions. We decided therefore, to cast the net as widely as possible in our September launch to appeal to as broad a range of children and young people as possible.

There is a modernist fad to appendage the word ‘church’ to almost any church-based activity. However, in a deprived context like Manton, there exists a gaping chasm between the life of the church and that of the wider parish. If we are seriously committed to growth and rejuvenation in a place like this, the words we decide to use to describe our services are incredibly important. Our children’s services are deliberately labelled as Muddy ‘Church,’ Active ‘Church; etc. as I want the children of the parish to use the language of ‘going to church’. My hope being that this helps to normalise the practice of church attendance amongst our younger people, in what is at times a very tough estate. You might think me somewhat naïve here, but quite incredibly, I have had

children knock at the vicarage door and ask when they can ‘come to church’ again!

Here is the pattern of our Sunday afternoon children’s services, they all start at 4pm:

WEEK 1 – MESSY CHURCH

With an emphasis on craft, creativity, and art.

WEEK 2 – MUDDY CHURCH

An outdoor service which focusses on our relationship with creation, stewardship, and food production.

WEEK 3 – ACTIVE CHURCH

With an emphasis on sport, movement, fitness/self-care, games, and public service/witness out in the wider neighbourhood.

WEEK 4 – MESSY MASS

Our attempt at nudging children and young families on from Messy Church and into the sacramental life of S. Paul’s. It combines elements of Messy Church within a children’s Mass. We encourage our children to participate in the Mass and have a go at some of the key serving roles: boat boy, thurifer, crucifer, sacristan etc.

FIFTH SUNDAYS – ‘THE FIFTH SUNDAY SPECIAL’

A time where we celebrate the children’s progress,



successes, and achievements. It includes a prizegiving, where books, Bibles and certificates are awarded. We have also developed the ‘Little Saints Cards’ whereby our children collect cards (printed business cards) and store them in a business card album (with space for 160 different saints!). The children earn different cards throughout the year for completing various projects or as a reward for regular attendance. The cards are printed with an image of an appropriate saint and a bible verse or a quote from said saint. If I had the time and resources, I would love to develop a full catholic awards scheme for our children and young people to work towards throughout the year and across the various age groups.

I must stress, these are not simply kid’s clubs, they are tailored services for children and contain a liturgical framework, sense of order and in the case of Messy Mass, are conducted with full reverence.

Alongside this, we have launched the 1st Worksoy Boys’ Brigade. The Boys’ Brigade is the oldest Christian uniformed youth organisation in the United Kingdom. This is the third BB Company I have founded, the second in the Church of England and the first in a Society parish. BB sessions here at S. Paul’s, operate as an extended church service. The boys gather and make the sign of the cross, they listen to a Bible story, there is a prayer and a song. They worship through craft, games, and activities all of which are linked thematically to the liturgical year. At the end of the service, we head into church (where we are teaching the boys to genuflect before the Blessed Sacrament), and we close with a song, prayer, and blessing. The boys work throughout the year towards a series of badges, awards, and certificates.

Life is certainly never dull as a transformational change priest! May I conclude this article with some words of encouragement for those who labour in similar contexts? Dare to be bold, but realistic in your planning and with your vision. Plan and pray for rejuvenation and growth with a spirit of confident intentionality. Recognise there will be moments of acute frustration and disappointment along the way and consider early on how you will process these hurdles; so they do not stifle your joy, nor threaten to derail your vision for the parish. Celebrate and give thanks for the small successes, publicly for the benefit and cohesion of your team; but more importantly, daily at the altar in the very presence of the one eternal, perfect, and faithful High Priest.

The Beginnings of New Life at St Anne’s

That’s going to be a tough gig,” somebody said to me when it was announced I had been appointed to St Anne’s in July 2020. I told them I disagreed. Strongly. I told them things were at such a low ebb it would be hard to take them any further down, and any progress at all would appear significant compared to what had gone before.

So where had this church got to? It had been built in 1872 with a rather nondescript exterior but a marvellous Tractarian interior, well meriting its Grade 2* listing. The parish was a small part of Derby’s “Old West End”, notorious for its dirty mills and slum housing, but also a staunch community spirit. St Anne’s had originally flourished in this environment, well-staffed by dedicated priests, supported by curates and nuns living in the adjacent Mission House, ministering to the needs of the community in the finest traditions of the Oxford movement. It had offered beauty and colour in the worship of God, the best show in town in an area that was hard and grey.

Things were going downhill at least from the end of World War II. In 1967 the parish became a joint benefice, sharing a priest with neighbouring St John’s (middle of the road Anglican with a good choral tradition) though it was till possible then to find priests who could minister to both traditions. In the late 1960s/1970s the area was redeveloped, much of the existing housing stock being demolished to be replaced largely with low rise flats and maisonettes. Many of the Old West Enders were moved away for the redevelopment, and the new housing, much of it less family orientated, was then occupied by new people without the folk memories of attachment to St Anne’s. The Council used many of the flats for people with problems, and the population became more transient, coming and going every few years rather than staying for generations. The church community became increasingly a gathered congregation of those who came in from elsewhere because they appreciated its very traditional Prayer Book/English Missal Anglo-Catholicism.

The last stipendiary appointment was that of the much loved Fr Michael Brinkworth who served from 1984 until his retirement in 2006, and did much to move things forward. After he had retired there had been a 14 year interregnum, during which St John’s opted to go its separate way. Fr Bob Boyle continued to serve as a non-stipendiary curate but Derby diocese refused him a proper appointment and he left for Exeter diocese in 2008. Fr Brinkworth continued to assist until 2013 when the church held its supposed last service. However, supported by +Roger Jupp (then serving as Parish Priest in Long Eaton, half an hour away) and myself as his curate, and indeed the then Archdeacon and Area Dean, services were resumed on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month only. Attendances were usually in single figures – breaking into double figures being a good result. I well remember when vesting looking at the picture in the Sacristy of the clergy and nuns in 1955, and thinking that there were more on the staff then than there would be worshippers in total that Sunday.

In 2019 the Deanery commissioned a report from the then Dean of the Cathedral which proposed closing St

Anne’s and then handing it over, surprise, surprise given the Dean’s evangelical roots, to a Holy Trinity Brompton plant. A singularly inept suggestion given the close proximity of another evangelical church and the unsuitability of the listed Victorian interior of St Anne’s for TV screens and music bands.

This was however a prompt for us to come up with the counter-proposal for me to be appointed non-stipendiary priest-in-charge and to seek to develop St Anne’s from where it was – the HTB plant being found a home in a former Society Church rather more suitable for it.

As regards the structures, the Church itself was basically sound, the roof having been restored in the 1990s. The interior smacked of faded grandeur, though it still feels a very holy place, the very bricks infused with the prayers and incense of past generations. The exterior looked very shabby with doors and noticeboards crying out neglect and lack of love.

Mission House was shabby but had been let to students and was providing an income. The Hall had been virtually unused and was suffering from neglect,



though from 2018 had been let for a couple of mornings a week to a charity, Derbyshire Refugee Solidarity (DRS) who were helping keep on top of the maintenance.

So this is what I was taking on. Eighteen months later we have Mass every Sunday with attendances usually in the mid twenties and occasionally pushing well over thirty with a robed choir and a team of servers. Choral Evensong and Benediction once a month (attracting mid-thirties) and a weekly midday Mass generally drawing around 10. I appreciate that there is a huge way further to go, and we will probably never restore the daily Mass or do as much as many other churches whose priests or people may be reading this article. But my key message is that a church that had seemed to be in the terminal ward can be turned round. And I have been asked to reflect on how this has been achieved.

I would firstly pay tribute to the remnant of the congregation, who reacted well to at last being given a priest and have been hugely supportive with their prayers and efforts. Led by a doughty churchwarden they had stoutly resisted the worst of the proposals from the deanery. And they included a goodly number of talented singers in a church with fine acoustics. I used to find that a congregation even of only seven in

St Anne’s could make a fuller sound than the much larger congregations in some other churches.

We were blessed by being able to attract a wonderful regular organist, and getting the music right has made a huge difference

A key early move was the simple step of painting of the noticeboards and the doors, which with their flaking black paint had become as welcoming as the gates of Mordor. I found the brightest Marian blue possible to make it as clear as possible to anyone passing by that the church which many had never seen open was alive again.

We were delighted to be among the first Ebbsfleet parishes to undertake the Natural Church Development programme, kindly and wisely guided by Fr Gary Ecclestone through a process of questionnaires and then feeding back and discussing the results to identify strengths to build upon and weaknesses to address. I was relieved that the survey feedback did not put my sermons in the latter category!

The Covid regulations were painful but we were able to turn them to our advantage. We always relaxed the constraints as quickly as we could and so attracted people whose regular churches were still closed or imposing onerous restrictions . And the ban on congregational singing was a good excuse for me to drive our best singers out of the pews and up into the choir stalls, where our organist soon had them rehearsing and forming a regular robed choir that contributes significantly to our worship. We also sought to be serving refreshments again as soon as we possibly could (including proper coffee from a filter machine sourced from eBay) as our sense was that as well as getting the worship right we also needed to afford friendship and fellowship.

Activity around the complex has also increased. The Refugee charity was finding it had more clients for English lessons than it could accommodate in the Hall, so we gladly made the church available to them for these. A good excuse to open up the doors and show the community that things were happening. Our prayers to see more children and young people were answered not in the way we had first hoped, but by the arrival of an Eritrean/Ethiopian Orthodox Church who put the church to good use early every Sunday morning, make a useful contribution to maintenance and cleaning and offer an inspiring example of how ancient traditional worship can speak to younger people.

The Mission House has been put to better use (the clue is in the name – “Mission”) by letting it to Ben Martin, a Pioneer Missioner from the neighbouring evangelical parish, St Alkmund’s, so that he can now work under a partnership arrangement across both parishes. With me being part-time and living 3 miles away, it is wonderful to have Ben and his family making the Mission House an avowedly Christian presence in the parish and contributing to our church community life.

So activities of all sorts are on the up. Our prayers have been answered in ways above and beyond anything I had expected. If asked for any advice as to what I have done as opposed to what God has done or others have done I would say only this. If the spirit moves people to come forward to help, my inclination is always to accept gratefully and to let them get on with what they are moved to do in the way that they are moved to do it. I seek as far as possible not to instruct but to encourage. To run a happy ship and to give plenty of thanks to all those who are contributing to the resurrection of St Anne’s, not least Our Lord himself.

David Morgan R.I.P

Here at the Church Union we were greatly saddened at the sad loss of our dear friend, loyal supporter, former chairman and council member, David Lewellyn Morgan. It is hard to express adequately in words how much David has contributed to the life of the Church, not only the Catholic wing of the Church, which he fought loyally for, and always supported in every way he could but also the Diocese of Chelmsford and all the different charities and trusts that David quite literally threw himself into throughout his life. His funeral took place just before Christmas and many of us were prevented from attending, but our sincere condolences, love and prayers are of course extended to Elisabeth and all the family. Here are a few personal reflections that just speak of David's contribution to a few of the many organisations and projects that he worked for and supported. The entire edition of Together would not be sufficient if we were to reflect on every aspect of David's life, but this gives us a flavour of some of those qualities and gifts that we have all witnessed in this most faithful servant.

As the current serving Chairman, I must add my own personal gratitude for the wonderful support that David showed to me. He was always the "go to" person whatever the question, whether it be parishes we were patron for, who are the trustees on any of the various charities that we administer or what is the history of A, B or C. David was a mine of information, a generous and loyal friend whom I personally am going to miss greatly and without whom our church is a poorer place.

From the Right Reverend Norman Banks writes

I first met David when we were both on General Synod during the tumultuous years of the nineteen nineties, although I didn't really get to know him and Elisabeth till my time at Walsingham where they were regular pilgrims and visitors. Early on in my time as vicar, while raising money to restore the village almshouses, I organised a week of events including an artist in residence. David and Elisabeth bought one of his paintings of the church at North Barsham and were very encouraging of the project and the artist's work. David was very fond of North Norfolk and enjoyed exploring the surrounding countryside and its rich heritage of medieval churches. And of course, was rightfully proud of his membership of the Council of the Guild of All Souls and the unique chantry chapel set within the grounds of the Anglican Shrine. David spent many years as secretary and latterly as Warden of the Guild and took his responsibilities very seriously. He had an encyclopaedic knowledge of the patronage in the care of the Guild and was a fierce champion of those parishes determined to remain within the catholic continuum of the Church of England. In recent years the Guild has continued to develop its work in providing publications for the bereaved and in a yearly conference held in Walsingham and he was keen to broaden its brief even further and offer its resources more widely across the Church.

Whether reading the lesson at the Guild Requiem at Saint Stephen's Gloucester Road in London, sitting in the front row at institutions and installations and presenting the new incumbent, diligently attending the local branch of Forward in Faith or surrounded by files of paper at council meetings, David has been a constant supporter, encourager and servant of the catholic movement throughout his adult life. Together with Elisabeth, David has modelled faithfulness to the tradition and a generous living out of Christian discipleship, for which many of us give heartfelt and sincere thanks.

I first got to know David Llewellyn Morgan in 1994 at Church Union and Forward in Faith events, at the Richborough Chrism Masses in Chelmsford Cathedral, and also at special services at Thaxted Parish Church, where David served as churchwarden for many years.

I got to know David rather better from 2002 when I was appointed Priest-in-Charge of Great and Little Bardfield in Essex. This was a Church Union living, and, following my appointment, David – who by then was the Chairman of the Church Union and thus patron of the living – invited me to meet him at Faith House, Westminster, for a sandwich lunch. As I walked down Tufton Street, I wondered what this might all be about. David quickly put me at my ease and proceeded to spend around an hour and a half telling me all about my new parishes and also about nearby doctors, dentists, and other useful local contacts. He took his duty as parish patron very seriously throughout my time at Great Bardfield.

Following some changes at Thaxted Parish Church, David and Elisabeth Morgan began attending services at Great and Little Bardfield. Mention of Elisabeth Morgan leads me to say that she and David were very much a team. They quickly became fully involved in the life of my parishes, not just attending our services on Sundays and weekdays,

By profession, David was a solicitor and he used his legal skills and insight to guide and help the Catholic Movement in the Church of England. He also used his legal knowledge quietly to assist many individuals. David was also a very generous man. I know he would be embarrassed if this was mentioned in any detail, but it is only fair that his generosity should be noted.

Towards the end of his life David suffered some serious health issues. I must say that he never grumbled or complained to me, and I should also record the devoted and self-sacrificial way in which Elisabeth and their family cared for him. I anointed David several times and took him Holy Communion at home. His attitude was always one of "No fuss!" David died peacefully at home three months after I had left Great Bardfield to take up a new appointment in the Diocese of Chichester. In his final days, David was devotedly ministered-to by my successor at Great Bardfield, the Revd Alexander Shannon, and St Mary's Church was packed for his funeral service.

David was a stalwart of the Catholic Movement in the Church of England. For him, the Catholic Faith was a God-given and true pilgrims' way through our life on earth to the fullness of life with God in heaven. In the general resurrection, may the Lord whom David served so faithfully on earth raise him up, heal him, forgive him his sins, and welcome him to share with Our Lady and all the saints in the wonder and bliss of the kingdom of heaven.

Mary Moore reflects on David's work in the Diocese of Chelmsford

David was a great supporter of Catholic societies. For more than twenty years I was on two committees with David. For at least the last twenty years we, as a Committee of Forward in Faith for the Diocese of Chelmsford, we used to meet in his solicitor's office in Chelmsford. After his retirement we met in various venues but David would travel to attend the meetings, this was often quite a distance for him. He and Elisabeth, his wife, would organise the Forward in Faith, Chelmsford, Annual General Meeting in the Shire Hall, Chelmsford. They would also organise refreshments after the Chrism Mass, in Chelmsford Cathedral. This was initially organised by David because he saw that Anglo Catholics, who met together on the Monday in Holy Week, needed the opportunity to meet and support each in fellowship, as well as Spiritually.

I also knew David as a Church Union Council Member and, whilst he was able, he would travel into London for Council Meetings and also, more recently, contribute via Zoom. David was the Secretary of the Chelmsford Diocesan Branch of the Church Union. He and Elisabeth would support local events.

David was a witness to the Catholic faith and will be greatly missed for all his support both nationally and in the Diocese of Chelmsford. May he rest in peace



The Worshipful Philip Petchey, Chancellor of the Diocese of Southwark, writes:

The almshouses known as Ilford Hospital were founded by Abbess Alicia of Barking in about 1145. The chapel is listed Grade II*. Canon Sparrow-Simpson (who wrote the words which Stainer set to music as The Crucifixion) was Chaplain between 1904 and his death in 1952. More recently, Father (John) Barnes was Chaplain. He loved this hallowed ground.

In 1981 the Hospital stood vested in the Marquess of Salisbury, the Cecil family having acquired it by marriage. It was time to bring the administration up to date, and David Morgan was at the heart of the negotiations between the Marquess and the Diocese of Chelmsford to establish a charitable trust. He then became Chairman and oversaw the necessary upgrading of the residential accommodation. He faithfully fulfilled the duties of Chairman until his death. Together with a body of Friends of the Chapel, he ensured the maintenance and improvement of this important building and the weekly celebration there of the Eucharist. His fellow trustees will miss his wisdom and friendship; the continued presence of the building and its ministry are among his memorials.

Father Simon Killwick, Anneliese and Mary Nagel reflect on his contribution to the Catholic group at General Synod.

David was a valued and caring friend. He was so helpful to me when I was new to General Synod and that caring friendship lasted throughout over 20 years. As a member of the Catholic Group he was determined, loyal and totally committed. He worked tirelessly for The Guild of All Souls. Being involved in the clerical appointments to very many parishes. He spent time to establish their needs by travelling to visit and getting to know them. I know that he came to Devon on more than one occasion, I know how much he loved and valued his family and feel their sorrow at his passing.

David was not generally a speaker in debates, but like the majority of Synod members, he listened attentively and made up his mind how to vote; he was, of course, absolutely loyal to the Catholic Group "whip"! Within the Group, he was one of those who helped to keep everybody together, with his friendly and outgoing manner; this cohesion and fellowship in the Group was crucial during the long and tense period of debating Women Bishops. David was also always cheerful and level-headed, which was a great encouragement to us all. Within the Synod, David was a good networker, who of course helped to improve our profile within the synod greatly. I personally found him friendly, charming, and supportive, throughout my time as Chairman.

The other difficult debate for the Catholic Group was Anglican-Methodist relations. We decided to support the setting up of formal conversations, though this was controversial within the Group. Again, David's good humour, level-headedness, and loyalty were a great help to the Group.



Signs of Hope in Walsingham


Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds. (John 12:24)

If we open our eyes and look around us there is so much in the world which reminds us of the Resurrection. As we leave the darkness of winter behind, with the days getting longer and the temperatures rising, we are surrounded by signs of new life. First the snowdrops peep through the ground before bursting into flower, these little white flowers are also known as Candlemas Bells or Purification Flower as they bloom around the time of Candlemas, when his parents took Jesus to Jerusalem to be presented in the temple and were seen by Simeon who predicted that a sword would pierce Mary's heart at the crucifixion.



These are followed shortly behind by other spring bulbs, many of which also have Marian names: daffodils (Our Lady's Star), tulips (Our Lady's Prayers), and bluebells (Our Ladies Thimble) all reminding us of Our Lady, watching, waiting and pondering. When they have finished flowering, they must die back and the bulb lay dormant until the conditions are right for them to spring into life again the next year. Around us in the fields there are other new signs of life; the lambs being born and skipping around the fields reminding us that Jesus is the Lamb of God, and the fields start to burst with crops again. Butterflies also start to appear; another symbol of the Resurrection because of their emergence from a cocoon and transformation into a beautiful butterfly.

Birds start nesting, many symbolising the Resurrection for example, the Dove, symbolising the Holy Spirit which descends



on the Apostles at Pentecost. During the Renaissance the Goldfinch became associated with various theological symbols, the most significant of which is the Passion of Christ, which of course relates to thistle and crown of thorns. According to the legend, a Goldfinch flew over Christ's head and was distressed by the thorns, which the bird attempted to pluck off. As the bird was plucking the thorns, some of Jesus's blood dripped onto the bird, creating the distinctive red patch of feathers on its head. Another bird is the pelican; often seen on church vestments and in stained glass windows. In times of famine, the pelican was reputed to tear at its own breast, draw blood, and feed its young in order that they may have life and so also became a symbol of the Resurrection.

Around us we see signs of hope that life is coming out of the darkness; not only the darkness of the winter months but also rising out of the pandemic. Slowly there is hope that case numbers are falling and life can get back to some sort of normality. In the months of darkness we have joined the disciples waiting behind closed doors after the Crucifixion, until after three days the light dawned and they saw our Risen Lord. Bit by bit, we have been able to leave our closed doors from full Lockdown, slowly meeting up with a few and then more people, our churches getting back



during the dark days of winter, and also throughout the pandemic, we keep the regular rhythm of the five fold Office, saying it on behalf of all those Christian brothers and sisters who are unable to join us. At the beginning of Lockdown, as with the disciples, we were behind locked doors but now the doors have opened and there has been an increase in local people and pilgrims joining us for the Offices and Mass. Another new sign of life is that we have been able to admit two new Associates just after Christmas, the first for over two years. Associates are men or women who while remaining in their own sphere of life, wish to share in the prayer and ministry of our Society.

All our Ministry flows from our prayer life, during the Lockdown many of our Ministries lay dormant. Even during a normal winter at the Shrine the Healing ministries and ministries of listening and talking to pilgrims come to a pause. But each year as Pilgrims return these resume and as the Shrine re-opened last year, gradually Pilgrims returned and the Healing Liturgies restarted. But that didn't mean that our ministries stopped, just that they changed; the Society of St Margaret was set up to do whatever needed doing wherever they were. Even during Lockdown we were kept busy as there were lots of people who appreciated a letter or a phone call to see how they were doing. And of course, our ministries aren't only with Pilgrims, there is plenty to do in the village too; the elderly to visit, leading Sunday School and helping with the youth group and leading Collective Worship in school. All these were put on pause during Lockdown but gradually we have been able to start visiting again; initially in people's gardens and then, slowly to resume normal visiting. Sunday school and the Youth group met whenever possible. It's great to see so many young people taking part and some have also been confirmed, starting a new life in the church. Collective Worship in Walsingham Primary school was the last ministry to restart but now we get greeted

to normal with singing God's praises restored.

Here at the Priory our prayer life is the basis of our Life and it continues throughout the year, even

each week again by eager pupils all wanting to take part in Open the Book.

During our times of recreation we have been bringing new life to donated bits and pieces; odd bits of wool knitted into toys such as 'Knitted Sisters', old candles melted down to make new ones or decorated with photos of Our Lady, old cards made into new ones, all sold for our Charity of the Year, bringing new hope to Children in Distress in Romania. In October, after a year without one, we were able to hold our Craft Week again, this time with a limited number of people taking part but hopefully this autumn with greater numbers.



Even our Crib in chapel, which remained there until Candlemas, points us towards the Resurrection. Not only are the three Wise

Men visiting bringing with them their gifts of Gold for a King, Frankincense for a Priest and Myrrh for His death but also present in a maid with a water jar representing the Wedding at Cana. This was Jesus' first miracle and foreshadows His resurrection; the miracle happened on the third day, as did the Resurrection, it also took place in Galilee, the same region as the post-resurrection appearances of Jesus. Jesus says to his Mother 'my hour has not yet come' pointing ahead to His Hour; the time of his death and Resurrection. Jesus asked for the six stone water jars to be filled with water which he then turned to wine. These jars were the ones used by the Jews for ceremonial washing, using these jars to hold wine meant that they could no longer be used for purification and was a sign that the Jewish Laws would be put to one side and the New Wine of Jesus take their place.

Now as the church year rolls on, our Crib has gone away for another year, Lent is upon us, the days get longer and the church looks forward to celebrating our Risen Lord at Easter.

A Vision of the Future



One of the things I loved growing up in a parish cared for by the old-style Company of Mission Priests was the Clergy House. A team of priests working together gave a kind of energy to everything that needed to be achieved. There was always a priest on hand to help in times of need, to answer any call for help. The parish I grew up in was cared for by three CMP Priests, who of course were paid only two stipends. Happy days!

Fast forward 40 years and it's a privilege to be part of a new project bringing together three parishes and four churches which look to The Society for extended Episcopal oversight. A long project in the making, it's not finished yet; but the newly-formed Priory Benefice is beginning to take shape. It all started when the late Canon Rodney Marshall came up and uttered the phrase every priest who knew him dreaded hearing, 'Now then, Father, I've been thinking...' – those words meant Father Marshall wanted you to consider doing something differently, something new, or something you would naturally shy away from. Following that opening sentence Father smiled and said 'So what about you going to Grimethorpe and South Kirkby? They're both in interregnum, there's a shortage of Society Priests, and I think you would be a perfect match'. That was the beginning of a great journey to bring together three parishes in what's now 'The Priory Benefice'.

Having served on General Synod for 11 years, I'm acutely aware of the politics within the C of E about parish structures and reducing the number of clergy to care for God's people. But despite the good stuff in the 'Setting Gods' People Free' agenda currently going through Synod, the Church still needs priests to

celebrate the Sacraments. As the Bishop's Representative in the Diocese of Leeds, I knew many parishes which looked to the Society for their priests were either vacant or becoming vacant. Father Marshall's words led to much prayer as I went to speak with Bishop Tony about the possibility of combining the South Kirkby and Grimethorpe parishes with the parishes of Brierley and Ryhill; all these were searching for a priest and I suggested to Bishop Tony that I would be willing to consider being their Priest in Charge provided I could work them with a curate.

As they say, the rest is history. It is no longer one priest for three parishes but a team of five, as well as several retired clergy! Two years on, the Team comprises me and a number of retired clergy, a full-time associate priest of incumbent status, and three curates in training (a permanent deacon, a transitional deacon, and the third a priest placed with us to complete his formation).

The parishes learnt to work well together even before the first Licencing. Some members of our congregation said it was more than the parishioners could have dreamed. However, with a new team came changes, and it's not always been plain sailing as it needed a change in mindset for some in our congregations. Gone are the days of one priest, one parish. The Team has worked hard to help folk realise we care equally for all. Like the old CMP house, each ordained person is differently gifted – some gifts we are still discovering, and the ones we know about used to great advantage. Sadly, COVID hit just as things were falling into place, but we were still able to introduce some exciting new projects to the parishes. We kept our churches open as much as possible, but also offered an online service, together with a daily prayer phone line which was recorded by the permanent deacons. At the beginning of the Pandemic, we hosted one of the streamed Lent Services for the C of E, as well as putting some of our own services online. But as we all know, worshiping online is not the same as worshiping in person.

Having two permanent deacons gives a different feel to a Clergy Team – they are passionate about reaching out to those on the highways and byways, finding new ways to engage with people who don't have a relationship with the church already. Having a team means there's always someone to work alongside, or call on for help, discussion and comradeship. I am reminded of Ecclesiastes 4.9-10: 'Two are better than one, because they have a good reward for their toil. For if they fall, one will lift up the other; but woe to one who is alone and falls and does not have another to help' (NRSV).

They say 'Teamwork makes the dream work.' This has been true for us. We discovered new ways to proclaim the Gospel and engage with our communities. A variety of gifts means we can divide the day-to-day care of God's people. We introduced an annual outside Carol service in every parish, and a series of travelling Messy Church events. A new project under the patronage of Simeon and Anna reaches out to 'indoor members' unable to be with us in person due to their frailty, which gives continued worth to people previously faithful in attending Church (it also improves our prayer ministry, and has been adopted by some of neighbouring Society parishes). Three of the Team sit on several School Governing Bodies which allows the Church a greater influence in the schools in our area, as well as helping make decisions about the young people who live in our parishes. We are in the process of introducing Anna Chaplaincy in one of our Parishes, and a new Alpha Course for those who want to consider the bigger questions and those on the periphery of the church family. The love and care we have for our communities has led us to host a training session around suicide prevention and recognition, and we will continue to build resilience around Mental Health and Wellbeing so needed in our

area. All these projects are not only good for our parishes, but good for the communities in which we are set.

The Team is blessed that each has the same vision for the parishes and we get on tremendously well! Our focus is to allow people to develop their relationship with Jesus. And the way we work with each other is a gift from God (we even have some fun at times)! Working as part of a team has allowed people to use individual skills and talents to reach out to all in our community, and identify areas where we have been lacking. We have not only brought together our parishes, but are also bringing other churches in our area to improve the communities we serve. United under Christ we are seeking ways to work ecumenically with other Christian denominations, as well as with other Society parishes, and our wider Church of England.

So, what does the future hold? Well, it's an ever-changing future, with new policies always coming out – around Covid, from the National Church, and from our local Diocese. Although we haven't been set up as a Resource Church, we see ourselves as a Resource Team, available to help our surrounding parishes when need arises. We have already covered services during illness, and funerals in vacancies.

I've always thought that when changes are afoot the best place to be is at the front, so you can help steer and shape the process. Here we are in a good position post-Covid, when cuts are likely to be made and things done differently. Maybe one way our Society parishes can use the experience of the Priory Benefice is to be proactive, to think about who they would partner with if the decision was made to reduce clergy numbers in their areas. We are currently going through this in our church school in relation to academisation, proactively finding the right academy trust to partner with, and the school helping shape its own future in a positive way. We can do this in our parishes – putting plans in place before change is forced on us can help ensure that the right partnerships are made. Change is not always bad, providing it is built on and underpinned by prayer.

Are you called to the Ordained Ministry?


A serious question that needs to be asked in churches of our constituency up and down the country. With a rising age profile of the clergy and the devastating effects of the pandemic, together with a wholesale re-working of parish ministry in so many dioceses we are facing a perfect storm. Predictions are over the next ten years we are going to see a radical reduction in all parishes but worryingly Traditionalists are usually the first to go. Have a look on the websites of our Bishops and you will soon see just how many vacancies we already have, and without wanting to be prophets of doom, unless we as a constituency do everything that we can to encourage more vocations to the ordained ministry then parishes will simply remain unfilled and give Bishops the perfect excuse to amalgamate, close or appoint non-Traditionalists into these posts.

It is often said 'no more priests would mean no more church' and this is entirely right, but perhaps we should begin one step back from this and offer the words 'no new vocations means no new priests.' The loss of that apostolic succession would end the near 2,000 years of discipleship and conversion to the truth of the gospel. We would, simply put, be a husk without the seed. And so let's be clear - vocations to the sacred priesthood are an imperative to our flourishing as Catholics in the Church of England, in our communities and as individuals.

We need to see a period of growth in vocations, to ensure men from every walk of life discern if they are called to that service in the Church, and so to assist those candidates and their parishes, we have developed a new approach, the Vocations Network - an initiative to connect, resource and support the next generation of Catholic candidates called to the priesthood in the Church of England.



Not solely a rebrand of the Catholic Anglican Vocations Initiative, the Network does build on the foundations laid by the 'Here I am' initiative, but fundamentally reimagines how priestly vocations can best be supported in the post-pandemic church and looks to fully utilise the ever-growing digital space to bring together a collaborative and supportive environment for the fostering of vocations.

Our vision is threefold:

- A focus on fellowship by hosting events online and in person which enable candidates, ordinands and curates to gather together for mutual support.
- Use new media to develop resources that inspire and encourage men from all walks of life to consider if they are called to service in the priesthood in the Church of England.
- Provide support and practical assistance to candidates in their preparation for selection.



We'll foster fellowship through our quarterly Gathering Online (GO) Sessions, where potential candidates can meet each other, share experiences and ask questions in an informal forum, so no matter which diocese the candidate is in, they will be able to engage with others going through the process. We're also launching Coffee with Clergy, offering a one-off chat with clergy undertaking vocations work, to ask in the initial stages about the process and what being a priest in the Church of England really is like.



Our website will have a range of videos, blogs and articles about selection, life in college or in context, reviewed reading materials and recommendations for apps to support prayer life and discipleship.

Residential Vocations Conference

The Annual Residential Conference will take place for the first time at the Royal Foundation of Saint Katharines in London. These beautiful facilities are 2 minutes from the DLR station Limehouse, set in their own grounds. This oasis of peace and tranquility will enable us together to explore the procedures and processes involved in selection for diaconal and priestly ministry in the Church of England, as well as worshipping together in their lovely chapel and exploring the challenging question of whether or not we are called to ordained ministry.

All the rooms are single and ensuite and furnished to a very high standard, benefitting



from everything you would expect of a modern hotel. On a full-board basis beginning on Friday 26th August with tea and concluding on Sunday 28th after lunch. At a cost of £150 this has been subsidised by the Catholic Societies, but there are grants available for anybody with financial difficulties.
